Ohio again exceeds 15 percent MBE purchasing goal

For the third consecutive year, the State of Ohio has exceeded the goal of its Minority Business Enterprise (MBE) program by purchasing 23.65 percent of eligible goods and services through certified minorityowned businesses, while spending just over \$305 million. Ohio's MBE program, mandates that state agencies set aside 15 percent of its annual purchas-

es for goods and services for certified minority-owned businesses.

"During the current administration, Ohio has made diversity among its suppliers standard business, meeting set-aside goals for the first time since the program was established in 1980, when Governor Kasich was a member of the Ohio General Assembly," said Gregory L. Williams, state equal employment opportunity coordinator and deputy director of the Equal Opportunity Division of the Ohio Department of Administrative Services, which certifies businesses into the MBE program.

"Our goal is to assist entrepreneurs, through this program and others, to develop their businesses to compete in the broader marketplace," Williams added.

Out of the eligible expenditures for goods and services purchased during Fiscal Year (FY) 2017, a total of 20.80 percent was set aside for MBE-certified businesses. Another 2.85 percent of eligible goods and services was purchased from MBE-certified businesses through open-market contracts.

ODJFS Encourages Employers to Hire Veterans

During Hire-a-Veteran Month, the Ohio Department of Job and Family Services (ODJFS) encourages employers to consider hiring veterans and reminds them of the many free resources the agency offers to help.

"Veterans are assets to our nation, to their communities and to the employers who hire them," said ODJFS Director Cynthia Dungey. "They have an amazing work ethic, they take direction well, they delegate well, and they're great at working on a team. Organizations of all kinds can benefit from their broad range of skills and expertise."

Through the agency's Veterans Business Support Center, employers can request online, over-the - phone or face-to-face help finding skilled veteran candidates for jobs. Within 24 to 48 hours of receiving a request, employment specialists begin sending employers resumes of veterans looking for work. They provide customized assistance tailored to employers' workforce needs, including recruiting, screening and interviewing veteran candidates. The specialists also can help employers:

- Find out how they can be designated "military-friendly."
- Find career fairs, workshops and other hiring events in their area.
- Learn more about hiring incentive programs such as the Work Opportunity Tax Credit.
- Learn more about the demographics of the veterans in their area, including their education levels, skills and cities of residence.

Some days we fight with Black folks. We sincerely wholeheartedly believe in equal access and opportunity for all.

How do you show gratitude to those advocating for your business? Are you one of those business owners who feels entitled to someone else fighting for your inclusion? How do you reward advocacy on your behalf? Do you send a simple thank you note? Do you speak before governing boards acknowledging how an advocate has assisted in you obtaining a contract? Do you put your very best foot forward when someone recommends you or introduces you to an opportunity because

If Not Now, When?

Dear Community:

Never before in recent history, have we witnessed the resurgence of the rapid number of Hate Groups as when our 44th President was elected into office. According to the Southern Poverty Law Center the Number of Hate Groups and other White Supremacy groups now total a startling 917, in 2016 as many of us sit complacent and put our future as a people at risk. However, the ideology of our 45th President is a new challenge and dilemma.

This current Administration has a willingness to create and implement policies, to turn the clock back and to set us back as a people, while fighting for 718 Statues and Monuments to remain in place all across this country. Protecting statues and monuments that were erected well after the civil war and in the height of Jim Crow that were designed to send a message to us as a people, yet we sit by and our collective voices remain silent. I do not believe our Jewish Brothers and Sisters would tolerate living in a nation that they built, where Anti-Semitic statues and monuments were erected to Adolf Hitler without speaking up. When you hear of rising Anti-Semitism, please know the Jewish population stands united, ready to fight and say "Never Again." Even in Iraq, the very first thing they did was dismantle statues and monuments of Saddam Hussein, yet statues and monuments that represent slavery, oppression, murder and the brutal treatment of our people are being fought for to allow to remain in place in this land.

We sat in disbelief and watched the march on Charlottesville, Virginia as the bold, young unmasked faces of the "new" Ku Klux Klan shouted "Jews will not replace us" and the commentary that flooded the news media was primarily about the anti-Semitic rhetoric being displayed in the streets of Charlottesville and across the nation. I guarantee our Jewish Brothers and Sisters are organized and stand prepared to fight the onslaught of this attack that is brewing underneath the surface of this country.

Yet, when you ask Black Brothers and Sisters in this city to stand up and align themselves with the oldest Civil Rights Organization in the Nation (The NAACP - established in 1908) for a mere cost of \$30.00 a year, an organization that stands everyday on the frontlines and deep in the trenches ready, willing and able to advocate for them collectively, our people remain silent and when you ask them to join, they look at you with a blank stare. I ask myself, why do we as Black people historically continue to work against our own best interest?

Most of you don't know and may never know the countless hours spent daily in Government Buildings and Municipalities

- 5. Certification can be used in the private sector. Many companies don't have a certifying program but in an effort to have supplier diversity, will accept the certifications from some governmental agencies.

Ohio's Equal Opportunity Division oversees the MBE program and helps to ensure equal opportunity access to and fair treatment in government contracting. It strives to maximize contracting opportunities through certification of minority-owned, women-owned and socially and economically disadvantaged businesses.

"It's about sustainability and creating more opportunities for all Ohioans," said Jeffrey L. Johnson, chief of the Minority Business Development Division at the Ohio Development Services Agency. "By meeting the law, we continue to move Ohio forward in diversity and inclusion while growing minority businesses across the state."

Background

On Dec. 17, 1980, House Bill 584 was signed into law, establishing the MBE program, which mandated that state agencies set aside 15 percent of their annual purchases for goods and services for certified minority-owned business-

As a member of the General Assembly in 1980, Governor Kasich voted to support House Bill584 and after becoming Ohio's governor made its achievement a priority of his administration.



you don't want to make your advocate look bad?




