Where There's a Will There's a Way

Many people know they need to put an estate plan in place but often times are unsure as to how to best go about it. It may seem daunting, tedious - expensive even. Do you need to hire an attorney? Many questions arise and you may get lost in the paralysis of analysis. Then you do nothing at all. Well my hope is to motivate you to action. Even if you believe you don't have any assets to protect, you probably do. Take a moment to take a mental inventory. Look around you. Do you have possessions that you treasure? These are all essential reasons to create the first essential element of an estate plan - a will.

Dying intestate (without a will) can prevent the transference of wealth in the form of real estate, assets and more. A will is an official means to communicate your wishes when your voice can no longer be heard. You communicate with your family, the State and any other interested parties as to how you want your estate, no matter how big or small to be distributed amongst your heirs. Once drafted, a will should be officially filed in your local municipal-

ity at the local probate court or other appropriate governing body. This cost should be less than \$50 depending upon where you reside.



If you have minor chil-

dren, or children from a blended family (children from previous relationships or marriage) it is imperative that you create a will. What if both you and your spouse, or partner perish together? Who is going to raise your children in your absence? You may be fortunate to have a loving, caring extended family or grandparents eager to take over your parenting roles. But if you don't, or you have several different groups of family in play, as in a blended family situation, your children may become pawns in a bitter custody dispute, as competing families vie for control of custody. Leaving both the State and Juvenile Court System to decide for you. A will that demonstrates your wishes as to who will raise your minor children will prevent this.

(Kujichagulia). Umoja means to strive for and maintain unity in the family, community, nation and race. Kujichagulia means to define,

name, create and speak for ourselves. Black folks in Columbus are divided. Many expect others to do the work while they reap the benefits. Some have crowned others leaders and then complain about their actions. Where is all the division getting our community?

The nation's 15th largest city has a huge economic divide. Many are thriving in the present booming economy. A lot, particularly Black folks are not reaping the economy's benefits. The public school system is failing our children. The largest public school system in the state of Ohio has repeatedly received failing grades on its state report card. Affordable housing is lacking. Homelessness is growing. Relationships with law enforcement is tense.

There is work to be done.

Columbus has a branch of the NAACP. The branch is membership driven and operated by volunteers. The mission of the NAACP is to secure the political, educational, social, and economic equality of rights in order to eliminate race-based discrimination and ensure the health and well-being of all persons.

I find it amazing that Blacks folks, **who are not members**, find issues with the activities of the Columbus Branch. Many nonmembers repeatedly throw rocks at an organization of which they have no investment. I rarely hear members complain about actions of the organization. As a life-member of the NAACP, I stand with the leadership. I applaud and salute their efforts to improve the lives of Columbus residents. My branch is doing what I expect it to do. Fighting for jobs. Fighting for contracts. Fighting to prevent voter suppression. The Columbus Branch has been active in seeking access to jobs and business contracting for Columbus' Black residents. They spent


My father once told me, "If you don't like how folks are running their organizations, start your own." Sage advice for the critics who throw rocks, name call and issue threats.






